OUR CANYON'S PAST

Pres. Longley, - Butte Record, Nov. 3rd 1877

HELLTOWN, October 25th.

EDITOR RECORD:—Accept a few drops of ink from your humble correspondent at Helltown:

Ever since 1851 Butte Creek, from "Black Jack's" ranch, below Diamondville, up to the mouth of Inskip Ravine, has turned out large amounts of gold annually, which, however, has not enriched the toilers materially, but has added to the wealth of the county and State. Butte Creek, in times past, has always sold its gold dust in Oroville, from the fact that Chico never seemed to take any interest in the mines until the present banks were established there. In fact, until Charlie Faulkner went there, its people manifested the utmost apathy in regard to the mines on Butte Creek. But Charlie had bought so much dust from our locality that he paid some attention to the subject as soon as he got established in Chico. Since that time your people are beginning to open their eyes to the importance of the matter.

Diamondville was once a flourishing mining camp, with a number of stores, saloons, butcher and blacksmith shops, and a daily stage to Oroville; but now, like Irving's deserted mansion, it is going to wreck for want of inhabitants.

Passing up the creek, we come to the town of Centreville, that was never known to export anything but gold dust—in exchange for which an immense amount of good whisky has been tunneled up between these grotesque hills and then tunneled down the throats of the lovers of the elixir of life. Dr. Brotherton's store and Hooper's Hotel are the prominent objects of the place. "Doc." is an old pioneer, and is loved by all for his kind and accommodating disposition. Mr. Hooper is an urbane, agreeable landlord, and sets as good a table as any one this side of San Francisco.


Centreville has a wealth of good hill diggings lying around her on each side of the

Creek, and when the water ditches, now projected and under way, begin to creep along her hills, she will open her gold tinted eyes and look as happy as a maiden with her first beau. From Centreville to Helltown a distance of two miles, follows a succession of comparatively unprospected hills on each side of the Creek, which will soon tremble with the hydrant farer that will be sent against them by the little giants that will tremble the hills like terrible Titums in conflict with "Jove." Then you can leave your sanctum and come up to hear the rumbling and the roaring, the clashing and the crashing that will awake the echoes along the lava hights, and startle the wild deer from his old familiar haunts. Helltown stands on a beautiful slope on the west side of the Creek, and is one the most lovely Summer resorts in the State, water cold as ice, and air as pure and balmy as Italy; Its people are quiet and law abiding citizens-in fact we have never had but two law suits here for the last quarter of a century and they were lugged in from the outside. You can throw down your most valuable treasures in open sight and go about your businesst with the assurance that they will be as safe as if they were looked up in the Bank of England.

Mr. Yokum has erected a large and commodious store house in the place and stands ready to cater to the wants of all who may call. With plenty of water to wash down its rich hills, Helltown will stand unrivaled in the State. Riester and Maltby have brought down water to Paradise Flat, one mile above Helltown, and I think when they get their claim properly opened will reap a rich reward. Fred Stryker, will in two or three weeks more have his ditch completed and be able to have a thousand inches of water on Whiskey Flat, that is known to be rich in the ore.

Pat's Castle or Chimney Rock, stands above Whisky Flat like a mighty giant looking down upon the ruin he has wrought. Coxtown or Phillip's Corner is the next

place above Chimney Rock, and has paid this summer from one to two pounds of gold every week. Next comes the Giant's caus way or the works of Captain William Welch, who holds on to his mining interests with a tenacity worthy of his early days in the Naval service of his country. Next comes McBridesville, established by McBride fifteen years ago. He is the lucky owner of a rich quartz ledge that has been cut in two at right angles by Butte Creek, and has been engaged for the last fifteen years in erecting a mill to crush his ore. I understand that he has nearly completed his works and will soon be crushing rock. I think the rock is extensive and good, for I can see gold inter spersed through it with the naked eye. I might sketch the different interesting places up to the Forks, but it would take up too much of your space, so adieu. MINER.
